

**JOPLIN CITY COUNCIL  
SEPTEMBER 20, 2021  
MEETING MINUTES**

**CALL TO ORDER**

The September 20, 2021 regular meeting of the Joplin City Council was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mayor Ryan Stanley.

**INVOCATION** was read by City Clerk Barbara Gollhofer.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA** was led by Dr. Reid Adams.

**ROLL CALL**

Answering Roll Call were Council Members: Charles Copple, Keenan Cortez, Doug Lawson, Anthony Monteleone, Gary Shaw, Diane Reid Adams Mayor Ryan Stanley, Phil Stinnett, and Christina Williams. Also, in attendance were City Manager Nick Edwards and City Attorney Peter Edwards.

**PRESENTATIONS**

Mayor Stanley presented a proclamation to Parks Director Paul Bloomberg to proclaim October 2, 2021, as Arbor Day. Mr. Bloomberg thanked Mayor Stanley and invited everyone to the Earth and Arbor Day event at Wildcat Glades on October 2.

Mayor Stanley presented a proclamation to Connie McQuillen to proclaim September 17-23, 2021 as Constitution Week. Mrs. McQuillen accepted the proclamation on behalf of Joplin Daughters of the American Revolution.

Interim Fire Chief Mark Cannon presented an overview of the Winter Weather Warming Center Guidelines. Emergency Management Director Keith Stammer was present to answer questions on this topic.

Interim Fire Chief Mark Cannon introduced Tom Jenkins, a consultant with Canfield/Jenkins, who presented the Fire Dept. Resource Allocation Study. The purpose of the presentation was to provide an overview of the fire department and some of its needs. Chief Cannon and members of the command staff have been working on a 5-year strategic plan and after a new chief is named, the city will bring the strategic plan forward and start to prioritize some of the recommendations.

The Guilty By Association Truck Show will be held this coming weekend from Sept 23 - Sept 25, 2021. This year's event will feature the great parade and truck show on Saturday evening. The convoy of about 400 trucks will leave the Joplin Petro area at 6 p.m., heading north on Schifferdecker Avenue to 20<sup>th</sup> Street. Trucks will follow 20<sup>th</sup> Street to Main Street and turn right, heading to 26<sup>th</sup> Street. From there, they'll turn west to Maiden Lane and the Mercy Park area. Drivers will park their trucks along 26<sup>th</sup> Street from Maiden Lane to approximately Moffet Avenue. The public is invited to come view the trucks, visit with participants, and enjoy the Street Fair. Country music artists Curtis Grimes and Joe Nichols will perform concerts beginning at 7:30. The parade will run down Main Street from 6<sup>th</sup> St. to 3<sup>rd</sup> St. at 10:00 am on Saturday, September 25. The football Lions will face Fort Hays State Tigers at 2 p.m. Saturday at Fred Hughes Stadium.

Citizens planning to burn yard debris will need a Burn Permit. The permit is \$10 and is good for 3 consecutive days. These are available from Fire Station #1 at 303 East 3<sup>rd</sup> Street or City's Finance Department here at City Hall. The Fire Station can only accept payment by check or money order. The Finance Department is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and can accept cash, check, debit card, money order, or credit card payments. No matter where the Permit is obtained, residents must still inquire with the Joplin Fire Department about weather conditions and if burning is allowed on each day. #### COUNCIL BILL NO. 2021-521

Mr. Cortez introduced Council Bill No. 2021-521 - an ordinance approving the Real Estate Contract by and between the City of Joplin, Missouri, a Municipal Corporation, and Jasper County Sheltered Facilities Association, a Missouri Nonprofit Corporation, d/b/a Community Support Services of Missouri, for the sale of 2202 South Jackson Avenue; and authorizing the City Manager to execute the same by and on behalf of the City of Joplin; and containing an emergency clause. Motion by Mr. Cortez, second by Mr. Lawson that Council Bill No. 2021-521 be passed on emergency basis. Voting in favor were Council Members: Copple, Cortez, Lawson, Monteleone, Reid Adams, Shaw, Stinnett, and Williams, 8. Nays: 0. Absent: 0. Abstention: Stanley, 1. The Council Bill was declared adopted and entitled **Ordinance No. 2021-128**

### **ORDINANCES – SECOND READING AND THIRD READING**

The following persons requested to speak on COUNCIL BILL NO. 2021-281:

Richard Hatfield spoke in opposition to this item by stating Par Lane is too narrow for construction vehicles and equipment, there are potential issues with the retention basin maintenance, and he's concerned about safety due to the increase of construction traffic.

Jerod Huebner spoke in opposition to this item and stated the Plat does not meet all the city's plat requirements. He also has concerns with no buffer, potential drainage ditch issues, safety, quality of life and he questioned if the lot sizes are proper.

William Alt spoke in opposition to this item and stated vehicles have difficulty turning around on Par Lane because it's too narrow. He asked why the project developer is not responsible for the maintenance and improvement of the road since that is the only entrance to the new development.

Mark Lane spoke in opposition to this item and listed several concerns. He said he hoped the builder would work with the residents to resolve some of the concerns.

Ken Myers spoke in opposition to this item and stated he has concerns with the retention/drainage issue, traffic, and construction vehicles.

Barbara Joe stated she had concerns about there being no buffer to prevent construction vehicles from using her property.

Blake Onstot, builder for the project, spoke in favor of this item. He stated he wanted to address the issues and concerns some of the neighbors voiced. He addressed traffic/road access; home values, and home size. He stated his company had no intention of negatively impacting this neighborhood in any way. His goal is to add a beautiful neighborhood in a great Joplin location.

Mr. Copple introduced Council Bill No. 2021-281 - an ordinance establishing grades and accepting the Final Plat of Par Lane Addition located at the End of Right-of-way of W. Par Ln. in the City of Joplin, Jasper County, Missouri. Motion by Mr. Copple, second by Mr. Cortez to pass Council Bill No. 2021-281 on Second and Third Reading. Voting in favor were Council Members: Copple, Cortez, Lawson, Monteleone, Reid Adams, Shaw, Stanley, Stinnett, and Williams, 9. Nays: 0. The Council Bill was declared adopted and entitled **Ordinance No. 2021-129**


## **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**
