PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 25.6 percent of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs continues to increase. Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 82.4 percent of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

The Joplin Police Department investigated 5,330 traffic crashes from 2015-2017. This included crashes on city streets, several state highways, and IS 44. Of those crashes, 94 resulted in a serious physical injury, and another 16 resulted in a fatality.

Of the 94 crashes resulting in serious injury or death, 7, or 1.3%, had alcohol as a contributing factor. Alcohol was a contributing factor in 122 total traffic crashes in the City of Joplin between 2015-2017. Additionally, the City of Joplin also serves as a nighttime entertainment hub for the region, with a large concentration of bars, restaurants, and a large casino at the edge of the city limits, in Oklahoma.

The City of Joplin is incorporated in 2 different counties, Jasper and Newton. According to the MSHP, from 2015-2017, there were 313 alcohol involved crashes in Jasper County, ranking 10th in the state. There were 221 alcohol related crashes in Newton County, ranking 15th in the state. For the same period, the City of Joplin recorded 122 alcohol related crashes, ranking 14th in the state. In 2017, the City of Joplin recorded 52 alcohol related crashes.

In the city of Joplin, we have seen an increase in DWI related crashes over the past 2 years. While we have always worked hard at DWI enforcement, impaired fatalities increased in 2017 from none in 2015 and 2016 to 6 in 2017. Our grant funded DWI unit leads the state in arrests every year and has been proven to be a great success.

We periodically conduct alcohol compliance checks to ensure laws are being adhered to.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

Core Performance Measure Goals

1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving involved fatalities by 3.45 percent annually, resulting in a five-year average alcohol-impaired driving involved fatality goal of 230.3 by December 31, 2019.

Other Performance Measure Goals

1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving involved serious injuries by 7.51 percent annually, resulting in a five-year average alcohol-impaired driving involved fatality goal of 505.1 by December 31, 2019.

- Arrest Impaired Drivers
- Educate the public on the danger of impaired driving.
- Work closely with surrounding and state departments to ensure involvement in programs and meetings that aid safer and more sober roadways.
- Work with community stakeholders, including bar owners, and public and private for hire transportation options to encourage sober driving.
- Conduct Alcohol Compliance Checks at establishments who serve alcohol to ensure compliance with state laws and local ordinances

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

We will deploy officers to focus on impaired drivers. Our main goal is to arrest impaired drivers and prevent alcohol related crashes.

Officers will be assigned to work overtime on a monthly basis at times that data shows us impaired drivers are likely to be more frequent. Officers will participate in state and national drive sober campaigns. Officers will be highly visible while conducting traffic enforcement.

This funding will be used for enforcement of impaired driving. Officers may also use this funding to investigate and prosecute businesses or individuals that sell alcohol to persons under 21 who could end up driving vehicles on our roadways.

DWI and Traffic Officers will work and assign other officers from within the agency to work traffic enforcement overtime during peak times to lower crashes through relentless enforcement and education. The traffic Sergeant will frequently review crash data and keep DWI and traffic officers aware of locations seeing higher traffic crashes and volumes, along with complaints.

Enforcement will take place 12 months per year with special attention to statewide and national traffic enforcement campaigns. The bulk of the enforcement will take place in the spring and summer when more drivers are out.

Enforcement will take place 7 days per week, all year. Additional enforcement will take place on holiday weekends and during times when increased travel is expected.

1. LiDAR / RADAR units. Speeding is a top sign of impaired driving. Having officers in the field equipped with a LiDAR handheld units will allow them to check speeds at extreme distances before violators see a patrol car and alter driving behaviors.

PROJECT EVALUATION

The MHTC will administratively evaluate this project. Evaluation will be based, at a minimum, upon the following:

The Joplin Police Department will comply will all of the above evaluation procedures. We will continue to evaluate our efforts by deploying the full time DWI unit into areas where alcohol related crashes occur as well as locations known through enforcement to have higher numbers of impaired driver arrests.

Additionally, we will monitor violations of serving to minors, MIP, and other alcohol service violations and conduct enforcement accordingly, as well as proactively.
